Anti-Social Behaviour in Eynsford

Summer in Eynsford is a beautiful time, visitors come from far and wide to enjoy the riverside scene with its iconic bridge, grassy beach and river aspect. It may be partly why some of us chose to move to Eynsford in the first place.

Yet particularly at this time of year, some people can demonstrate selfish, even arrogant behaviour which can make village life a little less enjoyable for residents. Antisocial behaviour can take many forms from the mildly annoying to the outright criminal and sadly we experience a range of these behaviours.

This is not just local to Eynsford, a quick read of the national press and you will see this is a problem across the country. There is also an-



ecdotal evidence that post covid, things are a little worse than they were. I'm sure academic papers are being written detailing the reasons and trying to get into the heads of the offenders, but for us we just wish it would stop.

There seems to be three key issues in Eynsford. Firstly, low-level incidents of vandalism and in some cases intimidation, leading in recent weeks to the temporary closure of Eynsford Castle. This type of incident, we believe, is caused by elements of the local community.

Secondly, we endure visits by groups of youths from outside the village. These young people congregate on Riverside and Common Meadow causing a range of problems. They arrive on horse and cart, by train, or car and treat the area as their own party venue.

Lastly, we have become a destination for traveller community organised 'ride-outs'. These formal events may be infrequent but when they occur they cause disturbance and traffic chaos for a period of time.

All this is of high priority for the parish council and we will explore all options

Jubilee Fayre and Post Covid Music Event 2022

Over the last year a small group of villagers have worked with Myself and Naomi Wintour to create some magic in the village.

Following the covid pandemic and lockdown, it was decided that everyone needed to be able to come together and share good times once more. Eynsford Parish Council and Farningham Parish Council contributed towards providing an experience for the residents. We were delighted when we were successful in getting a grant from the National Lottery fund to add to the 'pot'. This resulted in us being able to explore more creative ways for people to enjoy the Bank Holiday weekend and Her Majesty's 70 years on the throne.

After all the hard work, Saturday 4th June started out drizzly and windy and it was felt after all the planning was it to be a washout?!! No!! by 11.00am, the skies were clearing with blue skies and sunshine which stayed with us all day and no rain, even into the evening! Fantastic!!!!

The Jubilee Fayre was opened with a short prayer from our local churches and saw over 1200 people attend with approximately 33



stalls providing information, goods, games and quizzes for people to join in and were run by local community groups, local businesses and activity groups. We had a BBQ selling Norman's burgers and sausages run by Angela Brewer and Bruce Muckelt who worked so hard throughout the afternoon with a queue that never ceased until the very end! A tearoom with home made cakes made by Eynsford and Farningham WI's provided a welcome cup of tea and Mike Watling and Robin Steer-Smith thoroughly enjoyed running the alcohol and soft drinks area to quench thirsts!

Great entertainment was provided throughout the afternoon, masterly organised by our Master of Ceremonies, Geof Hillier from Riverside Players and included local groups Tots with Tempo, Riverside Youth Group,

to deter this kind of behaviour. That said, our powers and resources are limited so we cannot offer the guarantees we would all wish for.

Recently, we initiated a process of review for the Riverside area. The aims are two-fold; to improve the appearance and facilities and also to consider if any changes can deter or limit anti-social behaviour. We invited residents local to Riverside as their input is key. A range of ideas were collected and will be discussed further and prioritised.

Common Meadow (aka the cricket field) is of particular concern with horses being regularly led onto the field and groups congregating. We have been working with Eynsford Cricket Club to restrict access for horses - we're not quite there yet, but will continue to look at new solutions to protect this most important village space.

The parish council is not the only organisation to be focussed on this particular problem and you may be aware of Riverside Watch. Riverside Watch is a community initiative working to reduce anti-social behaviour and traffic issues in the village. The local residents bring new ideas and focus which the council recognises as vital to help develop solutions. I'm happy to report that Riverside Watch and the parish council are working together on these matters.

Last Friday, members of the parish council and Riverside Watch met with representatives of Kent Police and Sevenoaks District Council to discuss our concerns. We highlighted the key anti-social behaviour issues but most importantly were able to inform them of a planned 'ride-out' to the village on the August bank holiday. We made a firm request for some visible police presence during the event and this was noted by the police sergeant.

The key message back to us was to continue registering incidents and crimes with Kent Police on 101 or online. This helps build an intelligence picture that informs resourcing and patrol patterns. Please report all incidents if you witness them. Also, if you happen to hear of names or have images of people believed to be engaged in anti-social behaviour, rather than post on social media please pass this information onto the police. There are formal and less formal ways police can use this information.

We are aware of the issues and understand the impact on our community, and although we cannot promise to eliminate all anti-social behaviour we will do all we can to make sunny afternoons on Riverside as pleasant as possible.

New Village Hall Project

I last reported at the beginning of May when the archaeological investigation was to commence and assumed that nothing of interest would be found. How wrong can you be! Thinking that we would find chalk and more chalk below a layer of top soil we would then start work on reconfiguring the football pitch.

The investigation comprised excavating 9 trenches, 20m long by 2m wide and to a depth of 1.2m. The first two trenches, located in the farmer's field did in fact reveal nothing but chalk. However, all of the other seven trenches located in Harrow Meadow revealed some Iron Age, Bronze Age workings, consisting of pieces of pottery, fired and struck flints and pieces of Daub still bearing the impression of wattle rods along with various animal bones.

Our consultant has just issued their report with recommendations for further investigations within Harrow Meadow. At the present time we are trying to determine the extent of this additional work and of course the likely cost. When this work does go ahead it will mean that Harrow Meadow will have to be closed to the public.

A meeting has been held with the ground work contractor who submitted the lowest tender for the football pitch work and, given the ongoing archaeological work, it has been agreed that the start of this should be in the spring of next year. For those who helped clear the hedge line between Harrow Meadow and the farmland you may have to sharpen your chain saws as the bushes are sprouting.

We have now received four tenders for the building work of the new hall and are currently assessing these. It is fair to say that since the cost plan was prepared in 2019, the affect of inflation has increased the build cost by about 20%. The total cost of the construction is in the order of £1.7m. Once the tenders have been analysed we will arrange a meeting at the end of July and undertake a value engineering exercise with the two lowest contractors.

As at the end of June 2022, the overall project cost is in the order of £1.9M and the funds currently set aside, including an estimate for the sale of the existing hall site, is around £1.0m, therefore the funds to be raised over a two-year period will be £0.9m

cetera. You'll also find expert volunteers, with repair skills in all kinds of fields.

Visitors bring their broken items from home. Together with the specialists they start making their repairs in the Repair Café. It's an ongoing learning

process. If you have nothing to repair, you can enjoy a cup of tea or coffee. Or you can lend a hand with someone else's repair job."

"We throw away vast amounts of stuff. Even things with almost nothing wrong, and which could get a new lease on life after a simple repair. The trouble is, lots of people have forgotten that they can repair things themselves. Especially younger generations



no longer know how to do that. Knowing how to make repairs is a skill quickly lost. This is a threat to a sustainable future and to the circular economy, in which raw materials can be reused again and again."

We hope to run another Repair Café at Eynsford Village Hall on Saturday 17th September so look out for more details.

However, we need more volunteers to help with repairs. You do not need to be a professional, just someone who enjoys fixing stuff.

The Darenth Valley's Biogas Powerplant

Visiting a large scale anaerobic digestor is not a usual agenda item for the Parish Green Team but we were all curious to find out more about the 'mini powerplant' that has been built near Horton Kirby.

Firstly, what is it?! This particular powerplant is driven by anaerobic digestion. This process relies on bacteria and microbes to break down plant material to create biogas, which in turn can be treated to allow the gas to be used for heating and cooking or to produce electricity. The process also creates biofertilizer than can go back onto the land. Across the UK anaerobic digestors recycle 2.5m tonnes of food waste each year.

The site is large, much bigger than any of us had expected. Oncoland Energy have spent over £10m on the plant and it's run by a full-time manager and two staff. Initially designed to help spread the risk of fluctuating crop prices the digestor is also helping manage difficult agricultural waste, some of which produces large amounts of atmosphere warming gas - methane. Many of us in Eynsford will be familiar with at least one of the feedstocks used by the digestor – slurry from Bower Lane Farm! But, the site also takes in a lot of waste parts of crops, unwanted/oversized produce, including and rather surprisingly waste pomegranate skins. Carl

Nick says:



Digestor is a good description when thinking about how the process works – the feedstock is mashed and chopped up in a large machine (the mouth), fed into 'the stomach' through pipes, with biogas drawn off from the large digestors and then the odourless biofertilizer 'waste' is moved out into storage bays, before being used by local farms – very little is wasted.



Treating the biogas is complex and heavily regulated but the site is now producing enough back to the gas network to heat 2500 homes. The plant also has a small generator which, fuelled by biogas is putting electricity into the grid – about enough to light around 600 homes a year.

It was a fascinating visit, and we must give huge thanks to Carl Woolley, the site manager, who gave up his evening to show us around and explain the process.

Darenth Valley Community Rail Partnership

Users of Eynsford Station will have notice building works taking place over the last few months. This work was organised by the Darent Valley Community Rail Partnership which, as we have mentioned before, is an organisation formed, not only to improve the stations from Sevenoaks to Swanley to make the travelling experience more enjoyable, but also to encourage the use of the railway, which is a more sustainable mode of transport than the car.

Work started many months ago on the 'up platform' shelter which progressed so far – then stopped! There were problems with getting the necessary materials to the site which would have entailed rail closures and Network Rail were not keen to disrupt the timetables. Eventually agreement was reached which did not involve closing the line and work has now recommenced. Soon therefore there will be a splendid new, but characterful, shelter and the marvellous local artwork that was previously there, will be reinstated.

In addition, a new toilet has been created, at this stage unfortunately only available when the booking office is open, and the entrance hall and old waiting room have been restored to something of



their former Victorian glory. Users should take a look upwards in the entrance hall to view the delightful vaulted timber ceiling. The waiting room is also now virtually finished, with a few displays to be erected and furniture provided, and it is envisaged that this could be a room for residents to use who perhaps live in and around the station area rather than having to hire a room in the village centre.

There is also consideration to restore the old guard's room as an open 'museum' of railway artefacts and looking further ahead, funds permitting, it would be nice to remove the pebbledash and install the old canopy at the

front to restore the building to something of its former Victorian glory.

This has only been possible due to the efforts of the Darent Valley Community Rail Partnership who have vigorously been seeking funds. These have been provided by Network Rail, Southeastern and the Railway Heritage Trust amongst others and further funding is actively being sought. Currently there is also a sum set aside for a feasibility study into ways to make the northbound platform more accessible and also ways to make a better pedestrian access to, for instance, Lullingstone Villa and beyond directly from the station rather than having to walk to the ford and along Lullingstone Lane, with all its attendant accessibility problems.

Eynsford Parish Council are an active partner with DVCRP and we hope that these improvements to the station will encourage more rail use, especially by school parties as the economic benefits of using the railway, let alone the environmental benefits, are huge. We will continue to inform residents as works continue in the future.
