New LED Street Lighting Project

Further to our article in our Summer Newsletter 2016 regarding the installation of the LED lighting. The council have now agreed which LED style of lighting will be used throughout the village. This was after a trial at Priory Fields, where we placed the 3 different styles that were on offer.



The Corn Lamp at a cost of £95 per lamp,



The Gear Tray at a cost of £195 per lamp,



or the SL1W at a cost of £295.00.

At a recent meeting, the council agreed to install brighter (white) LED lights 'Gear Trays' on the main roads in the village (Station Road, Eynsford Road, High Street, Riverside, Sparepenny Lane and Crockenhill Lane) costing £5655 and to install more gentle lights 'Corn Lamps' on all other roads costing £4560.

The total energy bill for lighting for the village is some £3,000, so assuming a reduction in consumption of 65%, the LEDs should pay for themselves in approximately 5 to 6 years.

The installation of the new LED lamp is straightforward and takes approximately 15 minutes per light, so there should be little disruption to residents, and we are hoping that the work will be starting within the next month or so, but definitely within this financial year.

Land for Housing in Eynsford

You may recall me writing an article previously about land that had been submitted by landowners in consideration of housing development across Sevenoaks District Council, in preparation for a new Local Plan, which determines where housing development should go up to the year 2035.

The Local Plan takes around two years to formulate and we are already six months in, having had the initial 'call for sites', where landowners can consider sites for consideration of housing development. Although no formal decisions have been made about those sites, decisions will be taken in conjunction with consideration of the Green Belt Assessment, which Sevenoaks District Council has carried out in conjunction with ARUP planning consultants.

The Green Belt Assessment will (or has been, by the time you read this article) be submitted to the Planning Advisory Committee at Sevenoaks District Council on 17th January 2017. The Assessment gives pieces of land (or rather huge parcels of land across the District) an assessment of 0-5, where 0 means that the land is 'useless' in meeting the requirements of the Green Belt and 5 means it means all the requirements of the Green Belt.

I am pleased to state that the pieces of land at the back of Upper Austin Lodge Road, and the piece of land at the back of Priory Lane, have all been given a rating of 3, meaning that it meets many of the requirements of the Green Belt.

Furthermore, the land to the north-west of the village – land from

High Street Parking Restrictions

Many of you will be familiar with the traffic issues outside The Anthony Roper School, particularly at 'school run' times. Some years ago the Parish Council instigated the School Run Safety Campaign with the aim of identifying and implementing ideas that would improve the safety of primarily the children attending the school but also parents, staff and anyone else in the locality. These ideas have ranged from installing the pedestrian crossing to simply supplying hi-visibility vests for pupils to wear. Although individually these schemes may only deliver small improvements, together they are having a major impact on road safety in this area.



More recently the council has championed the implementation of parking restrictions on the High Street outside of Alton Cottages and with the promise of funding from our local Kent County Councillor, Roger Gough, we pursued this proposal.

News that planning approval had finally been granted came last month, which is good news indeed. Although we don't have a date for the full installation of the yellow line restriction, new dropped


Towards the end of last year, BT invited us to comment on a proposal to remove the telephone box located next to the car park by Bridge House.

This was part of a wider consultation across the country with the aim of removing from service telephone boxes that are seldom or never used.

Following some debate, councillors resolved not to oppose the

removal of our phone box should BT decide to do so. In fairness. BT have stated they would not remove facilities where there was opposition from the local council, however, we felt that in this day of mass mobile phone use the need for a fixed line telephone box had passed.

Andrew writes:

'Eynsford is probably seen by SE trains as a bit of a backwater, as there are more trains that speed through the station than serve it, so I think that attending their forums is our opportunity to voice our concerns to them, as they do manage the station. Also, there is representation at these forums from Network Rail, and ultimately they make the day to day decisions about the running of the railway.

The main issue for Eynsford users is poor timekeeping and the

frequent cancellations with the Thameslink service. The reasons for this vary. It's not just the weather of the leaves on the line etc. The main cause of delays is due to congestion which many find amusing when they hear this excuse.

The trains that serve Eynsford travel between Sevenoaks and stations north of London to Bedford, including St Albans, Luton and Luton Airport. This stretch of line north of St Pancras is very busy and heavily used not just at peak times. A problem with overhead cables in the Elstree area for example can create serious delays for us here.

As well as rail congestion, there is passenger congestion, and those of us going to work in the morning and returning home in the evening peak on the Catford Loop know only too well that a stop at a station takes far longer than the scheduled 90 seconds for passengers to get on and off. This is a major contributor to delays, and I don't see how this can be improved.

Major delays with Thameslink services can mean that a decision is made to skip stations, and usually they will send a late running train straight to Sevenoaks from Bromley South or vice versa so it can begin it's return journey on time. Not much help if you have had to get off at Bromley South or travelled with South Eastern from Victoria. And this is where I made my point at the forum. There needs to be some cooperation between the two operators when there are delays, where a decision is made quickly to serve Eynsford with a stopping train because when a train is cancelled or the station is skipped, the train behind can sometimes be thirty minutes away or more.

I am pleased to see that the new Class 700 units are being introduced on our service, and this should reduce delays caused by failures of the 30 year old units still being used.'
