Parish Council Budget 2023/24

By now, councillors should have approved the council's budget for the financial year 2023/24. The agreed precept is £90,188 which represents an increase of 5% over the previous year, significantly lower than the UK consumer price index of 9.3% (November 2022).

The parish council precept accounts for only a small proportion of the council tax which is mostly made up by Kent County Council, Kent Police, Kent Fire Service and Sevenoaks District Council. The new council tax levels will be published by Sevenoaks District Council later in the year.

As detailed elsewhere in this newsletter, the council has decided not to budget for a public works loan for the new village hall in the financial year 23/24. This is because the hall project is now not requesting this funding within this coming budget year.

NEW VILLAGE HALL PROJECT



We continue to work closely with Eynsford Village Hall Trustees on the joint project to build a new village hall and football pitch at Harrow Meadow.

Project Update

The Autumn newsletter reported that our archaeological consultant had issued their report to Kent County Council (KCC) regarding the findings of the initial phase of investigation and were awaiting feedback as to the scope of additional work necessary in order to discharge this planning condition.

KCC agreed that two areas needed to be investigated further, one below the footprint of the proposed new hall and the other in an area of



the new football pitch where the level of the ground is to be reduced.

Our consultant has tendered this work and the parish council agreed to accept the lowest tender with a view to starting this work early in the new year (January 2023).

During this work, Harrow Meadow will be closed to the public for safety reasons and each gate will be padlocked. It will also be necessary to close the play area for the period that the work is being carried out. Some temporary fencing will be in place and the public are asked to respect that this is there for their safety.

On completion of this second phase of investigation, the two areas that have been excavated will be left open but will be cordoned off. Again, the public are asked to exercise extreme care and to keep children and animals away from any trenches if and when Harrow Meadow is reopened.

In spring 2023, we plan to start the next phase of the project and carry out the ground works to rotate and lay the new football pitch. This work involves a considerable amount of earth moving and the work site will include an area north of the changing rooms alongside the tree line with the allotments. The site will be fenced off and the public will not be allowed into this area or within Harrow Meadow. Again, gates will be locked and access to the play area will not be permitted for safety reasons.

Funds & Fundraising

Fundraising and grant applications continue and our progress can be seen on the thermometer attached to the village hall notice board. At the time of writing this article, funds held by the Hall Trustees plus monies pledged by the parish council amounts to £470k and when combined with the CIL grant received from Sevenoaks' Council and from the expected sale of the existing hall site, amounts to £1.23m. With the overall cost of the project being around £2.0m we still have some way to go.

The development committee would like to take this opportunity to thank those who have supported the various fund-raising events including the sale of raffle tickets and Eynsford calendars. Public Works Loan

In the financial section of the Business Plan, which was developed during the year, it identified a short fall in the funding, which could be covered by taking out a public works loan. This is a loan, at lower rates than the high street banks and is paid back over a number of years by an increase in the precept part of your council tax.



Under the Local Government Act

2003, this guide sets out the criteria on which the Secretary of State generally applies in deciding whether to give approval. When applying for borrowing approval the parish council should be fully open with residents and details of the project and plans for borrowing along with loan repayments must be available to residents. This can include discussions at meetings or via a web site or through the distribution of a parish newsletter. Evidence of this will be taken into account in considering whether to give approval to a loan. In addition, when increasing the precept to fund borrowing, evidence of public support for increasing the precept is required.

Clearly there are a number of risks should a large funding gap occur, not only would there be the loss of our CIL grant, as it is dependent upon all the funding being in place, but if the whole project does not go ahead and the biggest risk is the village losing its community hall due to structural issues.

At the parish council meeting held on the 3rd October 2022, it was resolved to seek approval from the Secretary of State for a public works loan of £300k over a 20 year period for the new village hall project. It was also intended to increase the parish council's precept (which forms part of your council tax bill) for the purpose of the loan repayment.

The budget was discussed by councillors on 6th December 2022 and the inclusion of the public works loan was to be deferred until the meeting to be held on 15th December and when the full results of the public consultation could be reviewed. A decision was deferred until the meeting on 19th January 2023.

In January, councilors agreed that the 23/24 budget would not include a public works loan at this stage but agreed that the project as a whole should be presented to the public at a meeting to be held in March 2023.

Charles 111 Coronation

Annual Parish Inspection 2022

Parish councillors are constantly on the alert for action that might be needed to maintain village property and facilities at a high standard, but in addition to ad hoc year round reporting we conduct a systematic annual inspection of all property owned by the parish council to assess and prioritise routine maintenance needs.

That process has now been completed for 2022/2023 by some councillors going out as a group and some going out individually so assess designated facilities.

On the whole the facilities of the village appeared to quite robust and in good repair but one or two items were identified: a bench or two in need of a coat of varnish, one or two of the noticeboards e.g. outside the Olive Seal hall and in Mill Lane are in need of replacing, probably.



Also we notice some areas of subsidence by the river and

areas where the paving stones had become uneven and could be a tripping hazard.

Other, smaller jobs have been identified and prioritised, including the removal of the old village noticeboard from the car park.

It goes without saying, almost, that if any of our loyal readers feel the need to bring any issues of a maintenance related nature to our attention, then the best way is to ring the parish council office and speak to a clerk or leave a succinct message.

Eynsford In Bloom

Eynsford In Bloom, formerly known as Eynsford Best Kept Village Group has been in existence since 1989 and currently has 16 regular volunteer members. These range from school kids doing their Duke of Edinburgh awards, to enthusiastic pensioners. We meet on a weekly basis and tend

to various sites in the village. Eynsford In Bloom have won gold awards in the South & South East In Bloom contest (part of a nationwide scheme), for eight consecutive years. We are hoping to do so again this year but success has all been down to the passion and dedication of our volunteers who are all organised by one person, Pauline Penney. Now she has finally decided to hand over the management of our group to Kaz Langridge of the Eynsford Gardeners' Club and me, Anne Marie Fereday.



We have both been volunteers for Eynsford In Bloom for a few years now. Kaz has experience from working as a professional gardener for some years. I must confess I'm a bit of an amateur but my interest comes from a passion for the unique environment we have here in Eynsford. One of only about 200 chalk river valleys in the United Kingdom (and there are more in the UK than any other country), it is fragile but too good to lose to the threat of development or pollution. Many local farmers are encouraging wildlife, which includes wildflowers and species such as lichen and pollinating insects. It's clear that many of Eynsford's gardeners are also making efforts to compost and save water as well as tending their garden plants.

The group looks after sites around the village including the station, car park, Village Hall Drive and war memorial which we plant every year. We meet weekly on Tuesday mornings in the car park and also on Thursday evenings, when watering is necessary. In addition, we hold monthly work parties on the first Saturday of every\mathbb{n} month, in the mornings. We meet for coffee after our work parties, hosted by supporters.

There are also a number of "Adopt-a-Plot" sites available to work on at a time that suits individuals. We also meet up for social outings and take part in community events such as local fairs etc, so it's a great way to meet local people and make new friends! (We are always looking for new volunteers, so if you are keen on gardening or protecting the local environment, please get in touch with us; Anne Marie Fereday, 07792 663564 or email annemariefereday@me.com. There are regular updates on our progress in the parish monthly magazine "Trident" or check our regular postings on Eynsford and Farningham Massive, or on our own Facebook page.

Monthly work parties focus on seasonal tasks such as planting, deadheading, composting etc. Recent work parties have also focused on pruning growth on local trees in specific sites such as the station "triangle". But there are other activities – for instance, last year's wildlife survey of St Martin's churchyard. This is the first survey of this site since 2017, and it is a haven for insects plants and birds. The results of the survey will be sent to Kent Biological Records Centre and the Botanical Society of Britain – this is just one example of how Eynsford In Bloom liaises with other organisations.

Another of our sites is outside Eynsford railway station, where the "triangle" – the area of grass that stretches from the station building to the corner of the railway bridge – is kept in a wild-life friendly state, but the car park and planters are tended by us. The "In Bloom" contest itself encourages community work, for instance last year the 'islanders' of Old Mill Close entered a category called "In Your Neighbourhood", which designated for specific sites. We also coordinate with the Millfield trust and help their work parties.

Some of our work is just geared to good old-fashioned horticulture for example planting the War Memorial four times a year or tending Saint Martin's Church Rose Garden. The present inclement weather has stopped three work parties recently but our volunteers we will be working cleaning and tidying borders, plots and other neglected corners all round the village. We hope residents and businesses appreciate this and will support the voluntary team by creating interesting and colourful front gardens and entrances to ensure the village is attractive for residents and visitors.

We owe our success to all our volunteers but finally, we would like to thank Pauline for all her years of incredible hard work, as she prepares to hand over the organisation's future too new generation, and hopefully Eynsford In Bloom will continue to flourish and help keep Eynsford blooming!

Darenth Valley Community Rail Partnership ('DVCRP') – an update Cllr. Malcolm Richardson

A small ceremony was held in the waiting room recently to commemorate the completion of the restoration work to both this room and the booking hall. Representatives of the DVCRP were joined by people from Eynsford Parish Council, Eynsford in Bloom, members of the Shoreham Society and a number of Eynsford residents.

This work follows on from the restoration of the public toilets in the station and the ongoing work to the shelter on the London bound platform.

The results are impressive with the ceilings in both the booking hall and the waiting room being exposed, revealing an intricate lattice of original beams - residents are invited to look up next time they use the station!

Both rooms have been painted with period Victorian colours to provide a feel of the original station and some rather impressive artwork is also on



the walls, including a poster depicting Eynsford with a view of the railway arch – these can be purchased from the café at Bat & Ball Station.

It is hoped that the waiting room can be hired by residents for community use – for instance perhaps a meeting of residents around the station who do not want to go into the centre. Table and chairs will be available as part of any hire. DVCRP and EPC are currently considering how this might work with opening etc out of hours.

In addition the shelter is nearing completion – works were delayed by the freezing weather but it is hoped that it will be finished in the next few weeks. A new bench will be installed, and the artworks erected – two pointillist works (black & white dots) created by Graham Steel will be replaced (he has now left the village) by two new works of central scenes

by two new artists who live in the village.

It is also hoped that it might be possible to create a small museum of rail-way memorabilia in the old Station Master's office (next to the cycle shelter). This would be a static visual only display, perhaps behind a glass panel as a fair selection of original railway related items have been accumulated.

Thanks are due to the DVCRP for their energy (and grants!) in moving these issues forward – more initiatives are envisaged together with the Parish Council, such as creating a new footpath from the station direct to Lullingstone Villa and beyond to allow rail users and others easier access then having to walk into the centre of the village and along Lullingstone Lane, which can be quite dangerous for pedestrians.
